MINUTES

- 1. The meeting was called to order by Laura Nietfeld, MD, chair at 2:30 p.m.
- 2. The report from the April 12, 2024, meeting was approved.
- 3. The council discussed TAFP's inaugural Student and Resident Summit. The Summit was a hit, full of networking opportunities, education, and an evening social. More than 200 Texas medical students, family medicine residents, physicians, faculty, and other family medicine enthusiasts came together August 24 in Grapevine for a day full of career-building events.
 - Before the summit began, more than 80 people from around the state met for the Family Medicine Leadership Collaborative facilitated by the Faculty Development Center as well as the Clerkship and Residency Coordinators Conference, held all day Friday, August 23. These were attended by leaders of Texas family medicine educational organizations including department chairs, residency program directors, administrators, faculty, clerkship coordinators, and other family medicine champions. The groups spent the day sharing experiences and ideas, discussing common challenges, and hearing from various speakers. Thanks to the TAFP Foundation and its many donors, 130 of those students and residents received funding to travel to Grapevine and attend.
- 4. The council reviewed the new curriculum for the 2025 FMLE class. FMLE is relaunching after a short pause to incorporate alumni feedback. One of the changes is to combine the advocacy and communication sessions into one session and FMLE participants will be paired with an FMLE alumni mentor.
- 5. Council members were updated on the Residency Graduation Gift project which is in its second year. This year we had a 60 percent response rate from graduating residents.


- Which means we were able to mail out 203 graduation gifts! So far we have seen higher retention rates among recipients compared to non- responders. We will continue to monitor the retention rates.
- 6. The council was updated on the resolution advocating for a national tax credit for preceptors. The resolution was adopted by the AAFP Congress of Delegates. The next step includes AAFP bringing the resolution to the AMA to also advocate for the tax credit.
- 7. The council discussed the new pilot program which the TAFP was selected to participate in with the AAFP, called the Residency Ambassador Program. The Ambassadors will be new physicians, and they will receive training from AAFP and then deliver presentations to residents during their didactics.
- 8. The council discussed the 2024 HOSA Leadership Conference in Houston which had a strong presence of Texas physician mentors and medical students. HOSA Family medicine competitive event medical student and family medicine mentors are still needed. Anyone who would like to volunteer can reach out to Juleah Williams.
- 9. Tom discussed his article, "Reimaging Texas' Health Care System by investing in Primary Care Research and Innovation."
- 10. The council recognized the outgoing chair Dr. Nietfeld and welcomed incoming leadership.
- 11. The meeting was adjourned.




The following is data compiled by AAFP to give you a snapshot of our membership growth compared to national.

Retention

The rate can be difficult to calculate because there is movement of members in and out of the state. AAFP does an overall calculation and a state-by-state report looking at the list of members at the beginning of the year and whether they are still members at the end. Our retention continues to decline but is still higher than other extra-large state chapters and AAFP as a whole.




Retention of New Physicians – those in their first seven years of practice - is lower than active members in general. Here again, Texas has outperformed the overall AAFP rate since 2015.




Active Member Market Share


Market share is the percentage of eligible members who are currently enrolled. AAFP calculates this by defining the pool of eligible members as those physicians who graduated from an ACGME or AOA approved residency program. They exclude those non-members who are over 60, who do not have a license or have a bad address. TAFP lags behind the overall market share for AAFP but has maintained around 74% marketshare by their calculations.




One of the keys to growing our membership will be in converting more residents to active members. Resident members are automatically upgraded to Active and have reduced dues in their first year, but we still lose a significant portion. Many of our recent efforts are aimed at increasing that conversion rate. I don't think of that group as not renewing, I think of them as never really choosing to be a member since most of their residency programs enroll them in AAFP/TAFP and pay dues while in training.




Following are several charts that show our membership trends. We benchmark in January. This was the first year we had fewer members than the previous year at the end of January. That is a reflection of lower retention but also the move from Active to Life status.




We never tracked Life Members before but looked back to see the increase. While we had a 0.1% decline in Active Membership, we saw a 6.9% increase in Life Members.



We saw a decline in student membership during the pandemic that resulted in an overall membership decline and we never really recovered. Note that Texas has the most student members of any state chapter. Students tend to join later in medical school.

2025 Match Highlights: Family Medicine & Texas Focus

The National Resident Matching Program (NRMP) announced record participation in the 2025 Main Residency Match®, with 52,498 applicants and 43,237 residency positions offered—the largest in Match history. Of those, 94.3% of positions filled through the algorithm.

Primary Care Trends:

Primary care remains a strong cornerstone of residency training, with 20,300 positions offered across Family Medicine, Internal Medicine, Pediatrics, and Medicine-Pediatrics. Family Medicine offered 5,357 positions nationwide—144 more than last year—but saw a dip in its fill rate to 85.0%, down from 87.8% in 2024. This dip is largely attributed to the increased number of positions placed in the Match.

Applicant Participation:

- U.S. DO seniors achieved a record-high 92.6% match rate.
- U.S. MD seniors, the largest applicant group, had a 93.5% match rate.
- Non-U.S. citizen IMGs made gains in Family Medicine, accounting for 17.6% of positions filled in the specialty (up 2.2%).

Texas Perspective:

While state-specific data will be available in the full spring report, Texas typically plays a major role in primary care training. Given the national growth in primary care and the expansion of programs, including in Texas, these trends reflect both increased interest and continued need for investment in pipeline development, especially in Family Medicine.

In the 2025 Match, Texas offered a strong number of training opportunities across primary care specialties. Family Medicine remains a key player in the state's physician pipeline, though challenges with unfilled positions persist.

Family Medicine (PGY-1) in Texas

- 333 positions offered
- **283 filled** (85.0% fill rate)
- Filled by:
 - o 95 U.S. MD Seniors
 - o 107 U.S. DO Seniors
 - o 39 Non-U.S. Citizen IMGs
 - 30 U.S. Citizen IMGs
- 28.5% of positions filled by U.S. MD Seniors

7 programs had unfilled spots

Despite a strong fill rate, Family Medicine continues to face recruitment challenges, with an 85% fill rate compared to Pediatrics (98.2%) and Internal Medicine (93.7%).

Other Primary Care Highlights in Texas

- Internal Medicine (PGY-1): 856 positions, 802 filled (93.7%); strong IMG participation (225 non-U.S. citizen IMGs).
- Pediatrics (PGY-1): 223 positions, 219 filled (98.2%); about 52% filled by U.S. MD seniors.
- Med-Peds (PGY-1): 21 positions, 100% filled, mostly by U.S. MDs.

The full report, including detailed state and specialty breakdowns, will be released later this spring.

As of 2025, Texas has 40 family medicine residency programs offering a total of 333 positions. The state has 16 medical schools—13 allopathic and 3 osteopathic. In 2024, an estimated 2,300 medical students graduated from Texas medical schools, which is slightly fewer than the total number of first-year residency positions available in the state. (The most recent confirmed data from 2023 reported 2,459 first-year residency slots.)

Medical Student Scholarships

There are 10 scholarships which are announced in the fall and the funds are awarded upon matching into a Family medicine residency.

In addition, each Texas medical school has up to three FUTURE (formerly National Conference) scholarships – a total of 48 scholarships statewide. Each scholarship is \$600.

Resident and Research Scholarships

The Cassie Murphy-Cullen, PhD, resident scholarship is available each year for residents accepted to present research at a national meeting.

The TAFP Foundation launched the Family Medicine Resident Scholars program in 2020 to recognize and further develop the leadership skills of a resident at a Texas family medicine residency program. Two scholars are selected during their first year of residency and remain in the program until they complete their training. The residents will receive a total of \$10,000 to be paid throughout their training.

FMIG Support

Family Medicine Interest Groups (FMIGs) are eligible to receive up to \$1,000 per academic year to support activities that promote family medicine.

Student and Resident Travel Funding

TAFP Student and Resident Officers receive travel funding to attend TAFP Interim Session, the TAFP Student and Resident Summit, and TAFP Annual Session and Primary Care Summit. The delegate and alternate to FUTURE also receive funding to attend that conference.

Additionally, one student or resident from each accepted poster in the Annual Session Poster Competition is eligible for travel funding.



Council on Workforce and Member Engagement Preceptorship Update

The 2025 program is underway and is no longer accepting applications. TAFP is partnering with each Texas medical school to ensure outreach and support of our efforts. As of March 31, 2025, 291 students filled out applications requesting a rotation, 182 of those students have been matched.

Stipends will be given to the students after evaluations from both the student and preceptor have been completed. Stipends are available for pre-clinical students based on the length of the preceptorship and the location.

- Up to \$3,000 for a 4-week preceptorship in an urban practice
- Up to \$5,000 for a 4-week preceptorship in a rural practice/MUA/HPSA

About HOSA and the Family Medicine Competitive Event

HOSA—Future Health Professionals is an international student organization that encourages precollege students to explore careers in health care. The AAFP partners with HOSA to support the Family Medicine Physician Competitive Event, which gives students the opportunity to learn more about family medicine through interviews, research, and a peer presentation.

Participants conduct interviews with family physicians or medical students, research the specialty, and share their findings with peers in a formal presentation. These presentations are judged during the competition, and top-scoring students will advance to the HOSA International Leadership Conference later this year.
